As you know, Habitat East Jefferson County is working on a future build on the old airfield in Port Hadlock. But, did you know that before we begin building homes there in three or four years, we are planning to build many, many homes in the interim?

In fact, we are in the process of accepting homeownership applications for 10 new homes that we will begin building this Autumn. Furthermore, we will finish six new homes in just a couple of months.

That's a total of 16 homes in the works.

That means 16 families need your help!

Celebrating Six New Home Builds


On May 6, we held an Open House inviting the public to tour two of the six homes that are part of our Landes Street North build. Visitors had the opportunity to walk through the two-and three-bedroom homes, and meet with Habitat volunteers, staff, and future homeowners.

Landes North is part of Habitat's new Permanent Affordability program. This means that the Habitat homeowner purchased the home at an affordable rate, and their mortgage will not exceed 30% of their income. In exchange for affordable housing, the homeowner agrees to limit the appreciation on their

home. When the homeowner decides to sell, they will sell it at a price that should be affordable to someone else in the same economic bracket.

We are so excited to be close to completing these new homes for our Habitat East Jefferson County homeowners.

Who Are Habitat Homeowners?

Habitat homeowners are administrators, healthcare providers, emergency service providers, school teachers, entrepreneurs, artists, social service workers, counselors, grocery store employees, parents, grandparents, individuals, neighbors and friends.

All Habitat homeowners purchase their homes and pay a monthly affordable mortgage which is never greater than one-third of their income. Homeowners also contribute time and talent to keep the cost of building down.

There is a gap between the cost of building a home and an affordable mortgage. It is the donations from our community that make affordable housing possible.

Meet Habitat Future Homeowners

- **Kari** is a mother of two children. She manages busy school and extracurricular activity calendars, and also works full-time as an administrator with a local housing organization. On top of this, Kari also puts in sweat equity for her Habitat home.
- Taylor works at Finnriver Farm and Cidery and is also a local performance artist. Together, she and her partner care for their two children. In-between child care and jobs, they contribute sweat equity to their Habitat home.





Habitat's Homeowner Services Program

Leanne Smith serves as the Homeowner Services Manager at Habitat EJC. Her work at Habitat focuses on supporting our Habitat homeowners throughout their journey to purchasing an affordable home with Habitat. We had the opportunity to meet with Leanne to learn more about how someone becomes a Habitat homeowner.

Q. Who qualifies for Habitat housing?

A. Habitat serves a segment of people who make less than 80% of area median income. There are three basic requirements for qualification: 1) Ability to repay an affordable mortgage; 2) Willingness to partner: future homeowners have to be able to put in 250 to 400 hours helping build their home, or they contribute hours in some other way, if they are physically unable to work on home builds; and 3) Need for decent, affordable housing.



We look at the applicant's current living situation to see if it is sustainable, so need might be: unable to find an affordable rental, living in unsafe or crowded conditions, and numerous other factors.

Q. How do I know if I will qualify?

A. The best way to figure out if you might qualify is to start by taking an orientation. You will learn what information you need to share with Habitat, and you will be able to determine if Habitat housing is right for you. You can sign up for an orientation at https://www.habitatejc.org/homes. Once you apply, I meet with you personally, and we immediately assess your situation to see if you will qualify.

Q. How often does Habitat accept applications?

A. We usually have one to two open application cycles per year. It depends on where we are in our home building cycle and how many homes we think we can build. Part of that depends on land and cash donations, as well as home sponsorships. Additionally, it depends on the number of volunteers we have to help build those homes. The more resources, the more homes we can build and the more people who can become Habitat homeowners.

25 Years of Impact

Enjoy these fun facts and highlights from our 2022-23 Impact Report!





More than 5,000 people have contributed to Habitat since 1989 and we need at least 400 volunteers to help us in 2023 – 2024.

All kinds of skills are needed from construction, to land assessment, to office help and beyond.



We have pounded 720,000 nails since 1998 and we aim to pound another 55,000 this coming year. That's why we need help. If you lend an arm, we'll supply the hammer!



Last year, we received \$3,755,026 in donations!

For 2024, we need to raise \$3.5 million to achieve our immediate goals and set the stage for future building.

Builds in Progress

We will be breaking ground on 30+ homes in the next three years at Habitat EJC. That's nearly double the number of homes we built in the past 25 years! Talk about building capacity!

Not only are we finishing six homes at Landes in 2023, we are starting six new homes on Cliff Street, likely to be duplex style, but the design hasn't yet been finalized. And, we will start three homes in Port Hadlock-Irondale.

Here is an overview of the major milestones we are working toward:

- 2024: Habitat is beginning the process of planning for 14
 permanently affordable homes at Landes and 16th Streets in
 Port Townsend. We have recently submitted permits to the City
 of Port Townsend and are preparing for a public hearing to
 discuss the build.
- 2025: We plan to be breaking ground on Rhody Court, a pocket community of seven single bedroom homes. The homes will all be ground-level. We are working with the City of Port Townsend on the exact layout to bring this pocket community to life. Ross Chapin Architects are collaborating with us on the design.
- 2025 and beyond: Mason Street has the potential for 125 or more permanently affordable homes, of which Habitat will build approximately one-third and partner with other builders to complete the remaining.

We are currently in the process of selecting the Master Planner who will likely begin work this July. Part of the work of the Master Planner will be to hold community meetings to gather input from the area residents.

More details will be provided soon, including the announcement of the Master Planner and forthcoming community meetings.

Homeowners' Corner

Use Water Wisely at Home

By using water wisely, you can save money and help protect our environment. Here are five ways in which you can save water at home.

- 1. **Install a low flow shower head and shorten your showers**. You can save 2,300 gallons of water per year by replacing an inefficient showerhead. Shortening your shower by a minute or two can save 150 gallons a month.
- 2. Turn off the faucet when brushing your teeth or shaving. Simply turning off the faucet during these activities can save gallons of water.
- 3. Only run the dishwasher and washing machine when you have a full load. Not only will you save water, but you'll save energy, too.
- 4. **Install a rain barrel for outdoor watering**. By installing a rain barrel you can gather water year-round to use for irrigation, lowing your water usage significantly during summer months.
- 5. Check your toilet for leaks. To do so, place a few drops of food coloring in the toilet tank. Do not flush the toilet and wait 15 minutes. If food coloring appears in the toilet bowl after that time, you may have a leaky flapper valve in your toilet. Replace with a new flapper.


